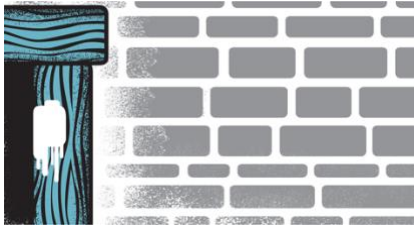

UNIT 4 | SESSION 2: God Shows His Power

Exodus 6:2-8 ; 12:3-7, 12-13 ; 12:29-32

MAIN POINT: *God keeps His promises*

STARTER QUESTION: WHAT KIND OF THINGS DO YOU STRUGGLE TO REMEMBER?

God is not like Dory, who is known for forgetting. He is known for remembering. He doesn't forget His promises and He always keeps His word. In today's session, we will see how God remembered His promises to His people and showed His power to be faithful to His word.

LEARN IT:

Exodus 6:2-8 | **GOD PROMISES TO DELIVER HIS PEOPLE**

Exodus 12:3-7, 12-13 | **GOD DELIVERS HIS PEOPLE FROM JUDGMENT**

Exodus 12:29-32 | **GOD DELIVERS HIS PEOPLE THROUGH JUDGMENT**

FIT IT: *Small Group questions/Family Dinner Table Questions*

1. In what ways do you sometimes forget about God's faithfulness and His promises?
2. How does knowing that God keeps His promises help us when we are going through hard times?
3. How should God's heart for those who are mistreated shape our own hearts toward those who are mistreated?
4. How did the plagues demonstrate that God is the one, true, and living God? How does it show that He rules over nature and humanity?

LIVE IT:

1. Spend time praying about what you learned from God's Word this week.
2. Pray for your small groups and your family's prayer requests.
3. Praise God that He is holy and powerful and that He always keeps His promises no matter how many times we mess up.

DON'T FORGET IT:

Christ Connection to the lesson: God's people needed the sacrifice of a spotless lamb in order to be spared from His judgment in Egypt. Jesus Christ is the Passover Lamb, the perfect sacrifice who protects all who trust in Him from God's wrath.

DIG DEEPER:

Essential Doctrine - CHRIST AS PROPITIATION

Because of God's righteousness and holiness, humanity's sins must be atoned (paid) for in order for people to be reconciled to God. For Jesus to be our propitiation means that his work on the cross was a pleasing sacrifice that satisfied God's wrath against sin. Christ's propitiation for our sins demonstrates both God's great love toward sinners (1 John 4:10) as well as the necessary payment that results from the penalty of sins (Rom. 3:26).
