""<sup>19</sup> For this is a gracious thing, when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly ...<sup>21</sup> For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. <sup>22</sup> He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. <sup>23</sup> When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly." – 1 Pet. 2:19; 21-23

"The essence of ungodliness is that we presume to take the place of God, to take everything into our own hands.
